Before you make a trip to the pharmacy:

- Check to make sure your network pharmacy participates in this program and if there are any restrictions. Ask if the vaccine is available.
- Talk with your doctor about which vaccines are right for you. You may need a prescription.

Adult Vaccine Recommendations

Human papillomavirus (HPV) series:

- Adults ages 26 and younger
- Adults ages 27 45 at risk or per doctor's advice

Measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR):

 Adults born in 1957 or later, who did not have evidence of immunity against measles, should get at least one dose of the MMR vaccine. Visit cdc.gov/vaccines for more information.

Varicella (chickenpox):*

• Adults born in the U.S. in 1980 or later

Zoster (shingles):

- Adults ages 50 and older
- Adults ages 19 49 with an immunocompromising condition

Pneumococcal polysaccharide:

• Adults ages 65 and older

Tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (whooping cough): This is a one-time dose given every 10 years and is different from the tetanus vaccine (Td).

Flu:* Recommended every year, especially for pregnant women, older adults, and people with chronic health conditions.

COVID-19: One or more doses of the updated vaccine depending on your health.
